# Washington Relay Comeback Wins Track Title

Washington's 1320-relay team, lacking one of its key men, ran the best race in San Francisco this season to nail down the Eagles' fifth straight City track championships yesterday at Kezar. An estimated 2500 fans in the sunny, almost windless arena watched the stirring race that decided the varsity meet.

Anchorman Clint Redus took the baton two yards behind Polytechnic's Gary McGraw and urged to a five-yard victory for the six-man team in 2:19.7, just one second off the record.

Thus Poly carried its at-

tempted upset of the city's ruling track and field power to the final event before succumbing by a virtually insignificant margin of three points.

The varsity meet scores were: Washington 51, Poly 48, Balboa and Lowell 25 each, St. Ignatius 16, Mission 14½, Galileo 7 and Lincoln 5½.

Washington also captured the 130- and 120-exponent divisions, thus sweeping all three meets for the fifth year in a row.

Two varsity records fell — Redus clipping three-tenths of a second off his :15.0 high hurdles mark of last year and Mission's Leroy Thomas erasing the

high jump standard of 6-2½ with a 6-3¼ effort.

Otherwise, it was a day of disappointments and near misses for would-be record breakers.

St. Ignatius' Bill Williams, his long arms and legs moving in beautiful rhythm, was only two-tenths of a second off the record of 1:59.3.

Discus-throwers Jack Egan of Balboa was confident he had surpassed the record of 149.3 — as were many officials present — until the extended tape read 148.4.

Lowell's Dick Bullock clocked :19.5 in the low hurdles, three-tenths off the mark and two-tenths off his personal best.

And Poly's outstanding miler, Mel Dowdell, came in with a 4:36.1, one of his poorest efforts of the year. The record is 4:29.6.

The 440-yard run, though far off the record of :49.2 set by the fabulous Grove Klemmer, was the high light dramatically.

With Poly hoping for a one-two finish in its strong bid for the title, Gary McGraw and Mitch Keller ran in that order through half of the race. Washington's Dennis Moorehead was 20 yards back of McGraw when he made his bid, one that swept him past Keller with 100 yards to go and caught McGraw a

couple of strides short of the tape.

Just as Moorehead forged into first place, McGraw fell to the track for second place. Moorehead's gritty race was timed in :51.6.

Redus' record-breaking victory in the 120-yard high hurdles was by such a slim margin that perhaps half of those present thought Lowell's Bullock actually had won.

Bullock's finest high sticks effort of the season was marred by a poor start that found him at a five-yard disadvantage to Clint at the first hurdle.

Entering the relay, the Eagles

led Poly, 46-44. Since Dave Vilner had scratched from the Washington team because of a leg cramp—just a week after another key man, Larry Frigallana, sprained an ankle — the Eagles were figured for second, or even third.

Washington was still gaining ground in the lightweight divisions, which saw a record broken and another tied, when the meet concluded.

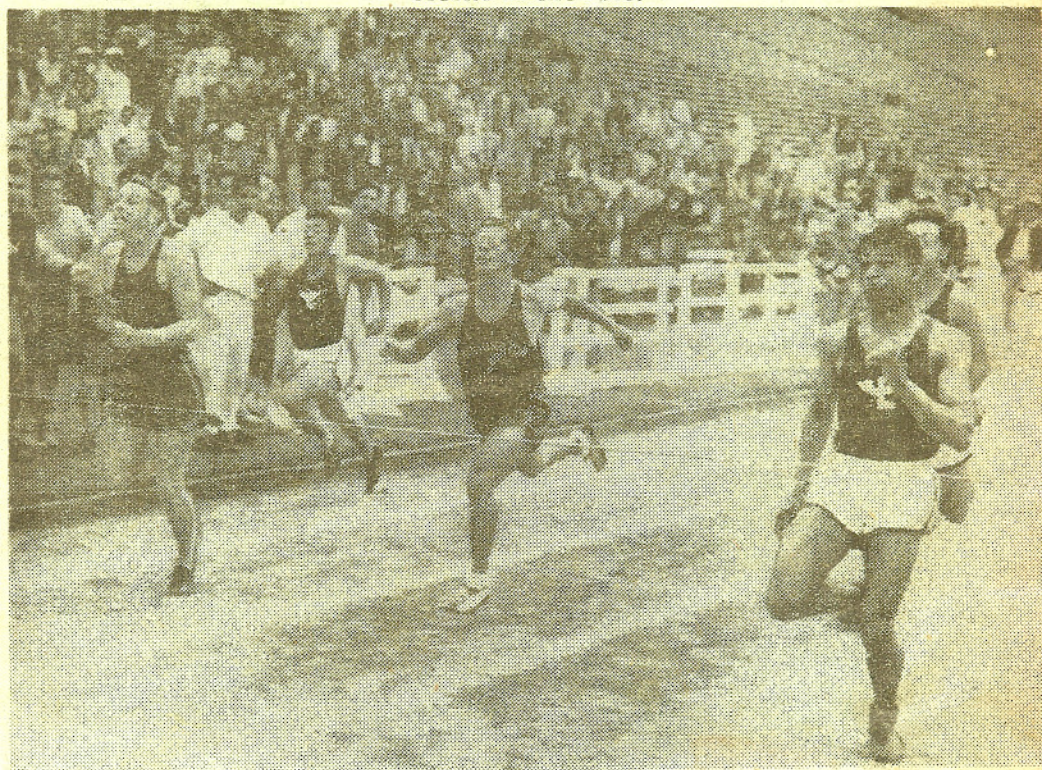
The Eagles' 880-yard relay team, anchored by Roland Carr, broke the 130-exponent record of 1:36.4 by 1.1 seconds and the 120 division low hurdles mark of
