

# Stephens Wins Two For Sequoia B Team

**BURLINGAME** — A lone sprinter was all that stood between Sequoia High School's B track team and an upset victory in the Peninsula Athletic League track meet last night at Burlingame. Menlo-Atherton captured the C title.

San Mateo's Bob Devencenzi came from behind to anchor the San Mateo 440 relay quartet to victory in the final B event of the evening, to give the little Bearcats 38 points to Sequoia's 34.

Earlier, Devencenzi had easily won the 75 and 150 yard sprints for the San Mateans, setting a new meet record of 7.9 for the former event.

thank Sonny Stevens for putting them as close to the title as they were. The Cherokee B hurdler pulled off a major surprise in winning both of his specialties.

Stephens crossed the tape in 9.7 in the 70 highs and 14.2 in the 120 lows.

Sequoia's Ron Swan, favored in the B broad jump, fell one-half inch shy of victory, leaping 20-2, far below his best of the season, 21-6. Swan was second in the 75 and third in the 150. He anchored the Cherokee relay team to second behind San Mateo.

Carlmont's little Tommy Jent drew a lot of enthusiasm from the crowd as he won the B 1320 in 3:18.8 by a good 40 yard margin.

In the C meet, M-A's boys dominated the shot put to get off to a good start. Dick Winter won the event with a heave of 46-3, with John Finegold third and Mac Chapan third.

Jerry Varty tied San Mateo's Gus Amarillo in the 120 low hurdles for M-A's Cs in 15.0 and placed second in the broad jump.

Menlo's Cs scored 37½ points to 23 for San Jose, their nearest competitor.

Sequoia's lone claim to C fame was Johnny Miller, who captured the 75 in 8.2 and came back to take second behind Carlmont's Stevens in a 16.5 race.

Although the winds slowed the milers down, the event wasn't a bit disappointing, as Carlmont's Craig Spilman led most of the way, but couldn't outsprint Paly's Ron Larrieu in the final drive for the tape. Larrieu was clocked in 4:29.2, with Spilman a little over a second behind.

With all other events completed, Sequoia's Matejka was all alone in the pole vault, when Kile went out after clearing 12-4. The Sequoian went over 13-3 fairly easily, and the increasing cold may have kept him from going any higher.

On his third day at 13-6, he barely knocked the bar off the standards. Matejka broke the meet record set last year by Jess Undlin of Burlingame, who cleared 13 1¾.

Lincoln's Dick Brown continued to demonstrate that he is a worthy contender for the state prep sprint honors as he battled the wind to a 9.9 hundred, one-tenth under the old record, and appeared to loaf to a 22.2 furlong, also against the gale.

Menlo-Atherton's track forces wound up seventh with 13 points, with Gordy Mathews placing third behind Don Wetteland and Jeffs' Jim Honeywell. Wetteland was clocked in 50.8.

Tom Strong picked up second in the discus throw for M-A as San Mateo's Rich Bortolin produced the best toss on the Peninsula, a 138-6 effort. The Bears got some more points when Bob Atkinson wound up third in the shot put. Sequoia's Bruce Byram, expected to take second, didn't even get past the preliminaries.

One of the biggest upsets of the meet was registered by Burlingame's Jay Sellers, who held off a determined bid by Palo Alto's Tom Cathcart in the half mile.

Sellers' time was 1:59.4, while Cathcart has a 1:57.2 clocking to his credit this year. Paly's Dean Satterlee, also figured to beat Sellers, wound up third.

Burlingame's 880 relay quartet came through with a mild surprise, defeating Lincoln for a 1:31.0 clocking. The Lions' Brown turned in a terrific anchor 220, but had too much of a lead to overcome.

# Carlmont Second Behind Burlingame

## Matejka Cracks Pole Vault Mark

### With 13-3 Effort for Cherokees

**BURLINGAME**—A terrific come-through performance by the four-man Carlmont varsity stole the show from Burlingame's victory in the Peninsula Athletic League meet held last night on a windy and cold Burlingame oval.

The Scots, figured no better than sixth on any dope sheet, wound up a surprise second with 34 points, paced by a great triple victory by Ron Valentine, who won both hurdle events and the broad jump.

Burlingame amassed 44½ points to justify those who had favored the Panthers, while Lincoln, also favored by many, wound up third with 33.

The Sequoia Cherokees proved to be just the opposite of Carlmont, failing to come through in any varsity events, with the exception of the pole vault, where Jim Matejka set a new meet standard with a 13-3 vault in the final event to be completed.

In the opening varsity event of the evening, Valentine won by a narrow margin over Jefferson's Don Weisner in 15.2 against a strong wind.

Still against the breeze he later won the 180 lows by a substantial margin in the good time of 19.3, just two-tenths off the league standard, and later added the broad jump to his list with a creditable leap of 21 feet.

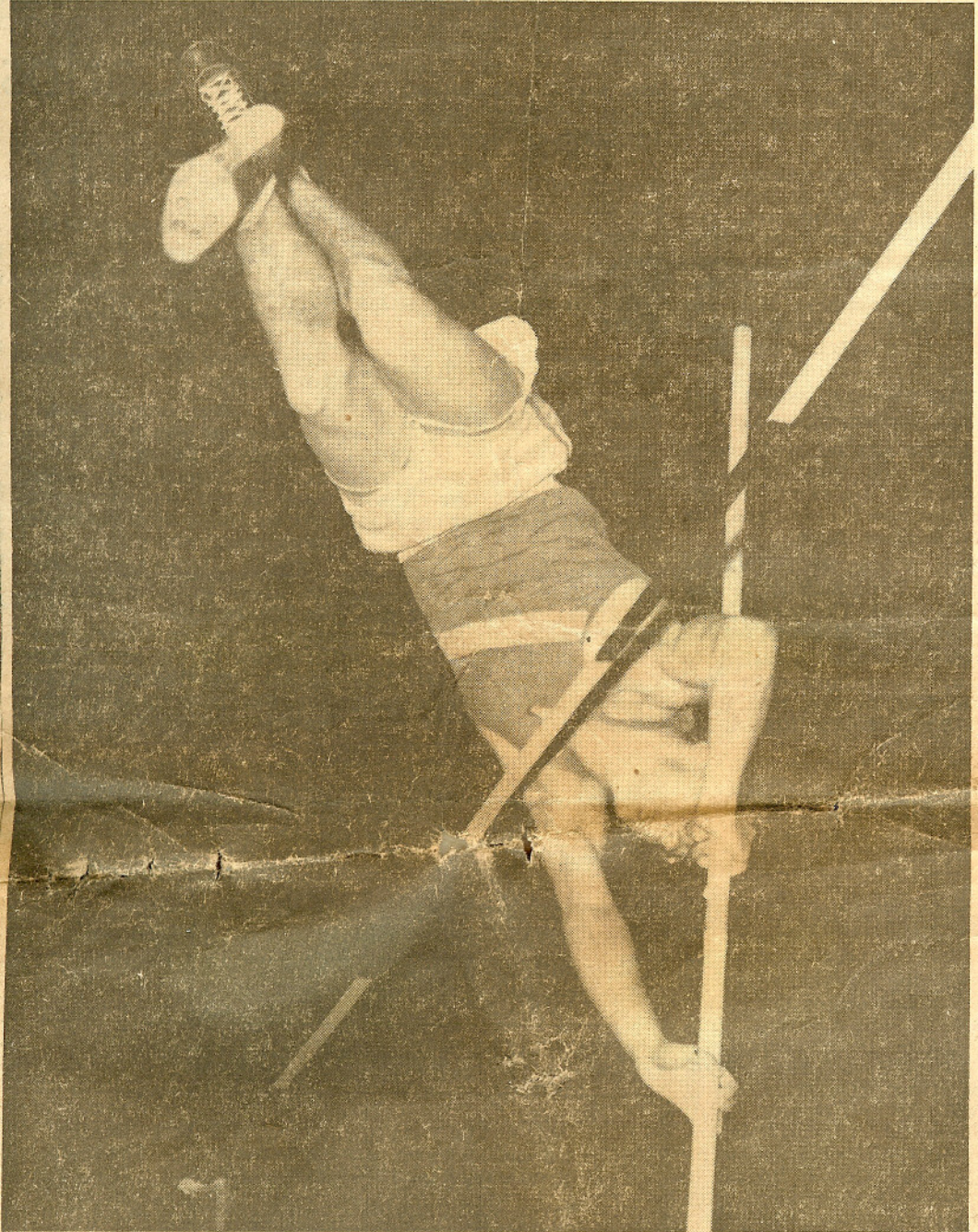

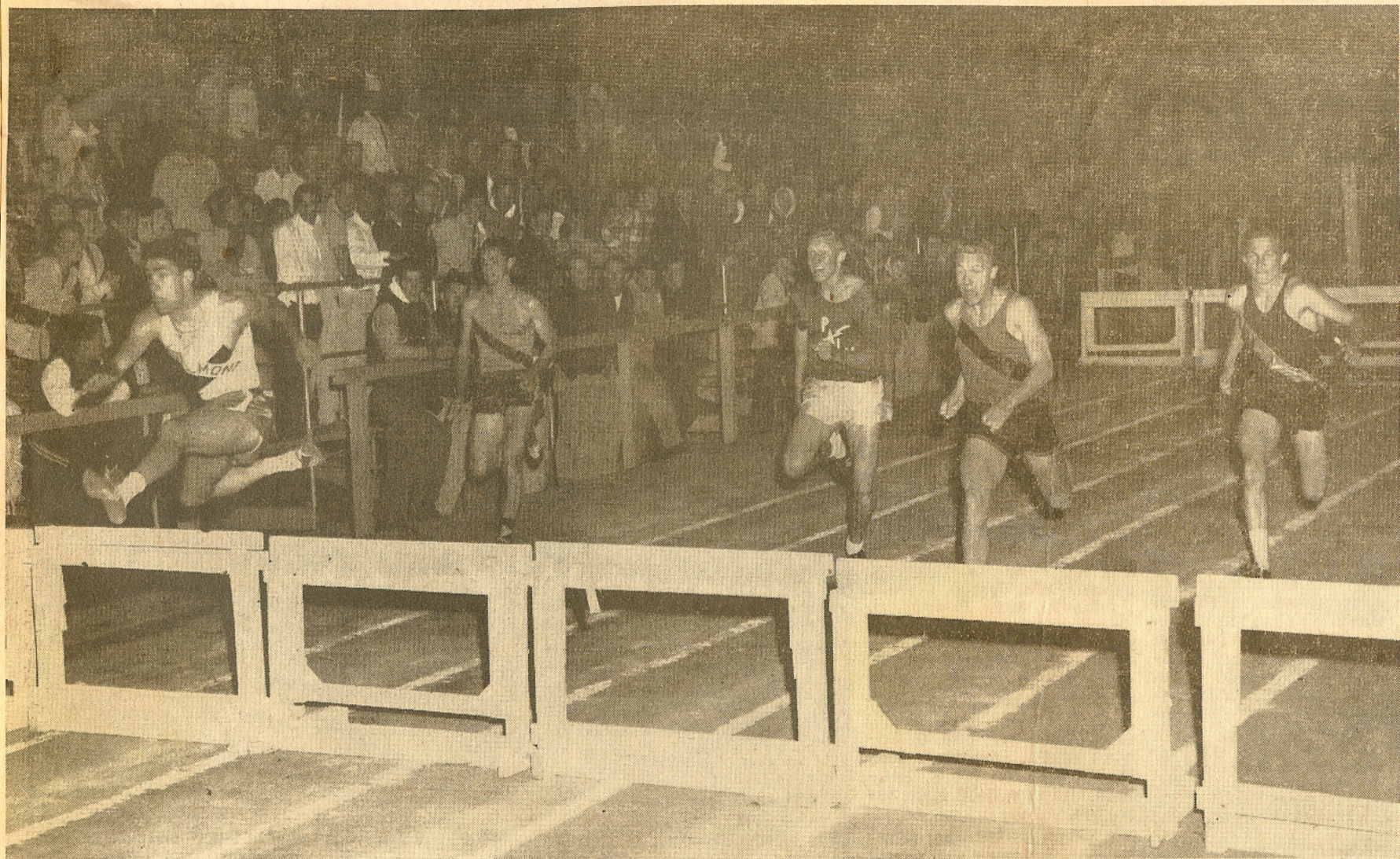
