Recruits' Won All-City

Good recruiting will do it every time.

The colleges know it. Washington High coach Harry Redlick found it out Saturday when a pair of out-of-state transfer students. Rvan Melton and Lance Ritter, led his Eagles to the All-City track and field championship.

The "recruiting" line, of course, was merely a needle put into Harry by friends congratulating him on his first AAA title since taking over at Washington in 1957.

But Melton, from Nevada, scored 13 points, and Ritter, a junior from Oklahoma, added 81/4. Since the Eagles beat St. Ignatius 511/2-46, consider where they would have been without the two husky "recruits."

The exploits of both were overlooked in the furor over Art Benton, Mission's junior sprinter who upset a fast 100 field in :09.8. Many of the experts in the stands said both Benton and John Daigle of Galil o, who took second, beat ine gun.

"It was the most ridiculous (Ritter was fourth). start I've ever seen," said

Benton, a quiet youngster with little to say about the whole thing, would only murmur, "It was a fair start,"

Piro, also a quiet lad, accepted his first defeat in city competition this year philosophically and at first refused to alibi, finally admitted. "I think I slipped at the start. I looked up and there were the men on either side of me (Benton and Daigle) moving out. I was slow starting because I was waiting for the recall gun."

Ritter said simply, "It was a false start."

But whatever the circumstances, these sprinterspossibly the finest field in the city's history with four men that had (sometimes with the aid of a wind) run :09.8 or better-were really

notoriously slow anyway and was made even heavier by the rains of the preceding 24 hours

Ritter, strong as a young horse, beat Piro handily in a :21.5 220, then anchored the Eagle relay team to a city record of 1:29.5. The Washington quartet had been cheated of the mark earlier in the week by a misplaced finish tape. Benton scratched from the 220 to save himself for the relays.

Melton was upset in the low hurdles but earned his keep by winning the highs in :15.1 and the pole vault at 12-6. Ironically, he almost went out in the latter event at 11-6, missing twice and jiggling the bar on the third try. But at both 12-0 and 12-6 he was over by at least six inches. On one try at 13-0 he went over but knocked the bar off with his chest on the way down.




