Castle Puts Shot 65-73/4

LOS ANGELES, June 17 .-(AP)-Tom Sullivan, a cinder cyclone from Evanston, Ill., unofficially tied the all-time high school 880 yard run record tonight in the second annual Golden West track meet at Los Angeles State College.

Sullivan, timed in 1 minute, 50.6 seconds, was named outstanding athlete of meet. His time broke meet. His meet record of 1:54.4 set by Whitney of Modesto, Calif., last year.

Don Castle of Palo Alto put the shot 65 feet, 734 inches -the best high school mark in the Nation this year.

Williams, quartermiler from Compton, Calif., bucked stiff winds to place first with a time of 47.3 seconds, far off his best effort this year.

Groth's 4:10 Mile Is New Prep Record

The 4:10 mile recorded by Morgan Groth of Alhambra High during the second annual Golden West track and field meet in Los Angeles last weekend will go into the books as a national prep record.

So says Don Nash of San Jose, who with Fran Errota publishes the popular School Track and Field Annual, the "bible" of prep cinder fans.

There was some doubt the mark would be accepted since Groth had already grad-uated from high school. Nash and Errota based their deci-sion on the fact some of the competitors in the the championships same weekend were also graduates.

Groth's clocking erases the 4:11 standard set by Dale Story of Orange in the State high school meet Bakersfield.

Edcoach Ray Alhambra man says Groth ran a "per-fect race."

Going into the backstretch of the last lap it appeared to be a duel for first between John Camien of Sewanhaka of Floral Park, N.Y., and Doug Calhoun of Culver City.

"Morgan was about 15 yards back," says Edman, 'and then he put it into overdrive."

whose tremendous Groth, finishing kick is familiar to Eastbay fans, passed both front-runners and held off a late threat by Camien to win by one-tenth of a second. Calhoun was third in 4:13.5.

The lap times for Groth, who reportedly is planning to attend either San Jose State or Oregon, are as follows:

He clocked 62 seconds for the first lap and was sixth in the eight-man field; moved up to fifth in 2:06 half way through the race; was third in 3:11 entering the gun lap and negotiated the final 440 yards in 59 seconds.

Groth's 4:10 Third-Best by Prep

Add Morgan Groth, the galloping Bulldog from Alhambra High in Martinez, as one of the most sought-after prep spikers in the country.

There was practically a news blackout on the second annual Golden West Invitational Meet in Los Angeles Saturday night. So we'll inform you now that Groth, the North Coast Section winner, beat the top graduated prep milers in the country with a sizzling 4:10! But Morgan had to hustle. A step behind in 4:10.1 was John Camien of Floral Park High in New York City. Third was Doug Calhoun of Culver City in 4:13.5.

All the wire stories provided was the 1:50.6 half-mile by Tommy Sullivan of Evanston, Ill., which is skidding right along, you must

admit.

Groth now becomes the third-fastest prep miler of all time. Sullivan's fantastic 4:03 at the Compton Relays this season ranks as No. 1, natch. Second is Archie San Romani, now at Oregon State, who reeled off a 4:03.9 at Compton in 1959. Dale Story still holds the State record of 4:11, which is fourth on the all-time.

Groth still hasn't made up his mind about a college. He needs a year of junior college, but after that it'll be either Oregon or

San Jose State. If you're a betting man, take Oregon.

Ray Saddler of Castlemont High again was soundly whipped by Compton's Ulis Williams, who won the 440 in 47:3. Saddler was third in 48.4, two-tenths behind Dave Archibald of Leuzinger High in SoCal. That's the same Archibald who is ticketed for Cal, incidentally. Saddler, though, hitched up with a crew from Harbor to win the eight-man mile relay in 2:56.0. And if you're not familiar with that time, just divide by two and you get a fair pair of 880 relays (1:28-flat!).

Here are results of other events: Shot Put—Don Castle of Cubberly, 65-7%, his best-ever and No. 1 prep mark in the country this season. Don got revenge over Bill Pace of El Rancho who beat Castle in

the State.

Pace was second with 64-0½. DISCUS—Don Schmidt, King City, 180-1. Sprints—Ray Etherly, the Albuquerque (N.M.) High flash who buzzed 9.7 and 21.3, with Ralph Turner of Glendale's Burroughs High second both times in 9.8 and 21.4. 180 lows—Bill Mackey, East Bakersfield, 18.8.

The high jump proved a real dud with unheralded Randy Walker of Reseda's Cleveland High winning at a low 6-4½. Roy Hicks, the fabled Texan from Coles High of Corpus Christi who came in with a best of 6-10, could only manage third place at 6-2! But Hicks did

win the highs in 14.3.
