No-nonsense Sam Maxwell high jumped 6 feet 9 inches and a quartet of his teammates zipped to a 42.3 quarter-mile relay as classy Castlemont claimed its eighth consecutive title in the 50th Oakland Athletic League track and field championships yesterday.

Junior Jim Beaver of Skyline and Fremont's Monti Stratton joined Maxwell as record breakers, the former holding off Albert Baker of the Knights in a 1:55-flat half mile and the latter pole vaulting 13-71/2 at chilly, windy Skyline High.

The Beaver-Baker 880 duel was a thriller from the time the Titan began to close at the start of the gun lap.

Beaver took the lead for the first time on the curve, and the pair battled headand-head in the backstretch with Baker regaining a slight edge. Beaver took command again in the final turn, but Baker wasn't through yet.

Trailing by a stride, the Knight senior made a gallant bid to make up the deficit in the stretch and might have done it had not Beaver lunged into the tape with what seemed his last ounce of strength.

Both runners were timed in 1:55, the second fastest this season for the Alameda County-Contra Costa County area. It was a 2.4-second improvement for Beaver and broke the former standard by 1.9 seconds.

Stratton, defending the vault title, trailed Skyline's Ed Otter on misses until making the record height. The Titan had not failed at any previous height.

Vaulting behind Otter, Stratton got over on his final attempt to better the old mark by 31/2 inches.

Tech Junior Marvin Jefferson lowered his 440 time by three-tenths in 49.2; Glenn Hewitt, sophomore cousin of 1968 state champion Heulon Hewitt of Merced, won the long jump on his only fair attempt, and Castlemont soph Ken Farrell took the two-mile.

Wayne Dillard of the Knights repeated in both hurdle races, and the next three finishers behind Murphy in the 220 bettered their previous best times.
