

# Pioneers Garner

# CCS Track Title

Cupertino led a Santa Clara Valley League assault on the Central Coast Section track and field championships at San Jose City College Saturday night.

The Pioneers scored in only two events, but their effort was good for 18 points in a one-point victory over Awalt.

Crestmoor, paced by Chuck Bommarito's double triumph in the 100 and 220, was the only team outside of the SCVL to crack the top four, finishing with 14 points, one better than the Benny Brown-led Dunnyvale crew.

Craig Conway, along with Bommarito, were the meet's only two double winners. Conway, who set a CCS record at 49.5 in the triple jump, won the long jump at 23.7, the two victories worth 12 points.

Pioneer teammate Mark

Thorp, a sophomore, finished third in both jumps, which enabled Cupertino to garner the team diadem.

Awalt was paced by miler Dave Chamness, a third-place finisher in the state last year but beset by injuries this season, who won the mile in 4:14.2.

Bommarito's 220 time of 21.4 is also a CCS standard, breaking his mark of 21.6 set last year and nipping Brown by four-tenths of a second. *Brown = 21.8 (2nd)*

After eight events, Cupertino, on the strength of Craig Conway's CCS record 49.5 effort in the triple jump, led the team chase with nine points.

One major disappointment occurred in the evening's third event, the 120-yard high hurdles. Dave Bagshaw, who in the morning trials set a meet record of 14.2 and went to the State Meet as a junior last year, tripped over the final hurdle and didn't finish

the race. At the time, Bagshaw had a three-yard lead.

As a result, of the mishap, Silver Creek's Bill Wright won the highs in 14.5.

Bommarito and Brown brought most of the cheers from the near-capacity crowd.

Bommarito, a third-place finisher in the 100 in last year's State Meet, once again got a slow start but flew by the pack in the last 40 yards to win the century in 9.8. Seaside's Tony Paftris and Harbor's Don Green also earned State berths as they finished second and third, respectively.

Brown, besides earning a State invitation with his easy 48.2 victory in the 440, made it possible for the three other members of the Jets' 440 relay team to make the trip to Los Angeles.

Taking the baton to seventh position on the anchor leg of the quarter-mile relay, Brown turned it on to pull his team to third behind Monterey (2:26) and Ravenswood (2:28). Sunnyvale clocked 43.0, the same time as Seaside.

Saratoga's Mike Tyrrell found out how to beat Westmont's Randy Carlson in last week's Region III meet and now seems intent on making a habit of it.

Both Tyrrell and Carlson were clocked in 1:52.2 for the half-mile with Tyrrell getting the officials' nod. Gilroy's Oscar Morales finished third in 1:54.2.

In the weight events, Fremont's Kim Aldrich won the shot put with a toss of 59.5. Los Gatos' Bret Mannom, the CCS leader all season, finished second at 58.8.

Scott Overton, of Los Altos, who set a CCS season-best of 184.0 in the morning trials, won the discus at 184.9, easily outdistancing Awalt's Walt Pfandl, whose best effort was 171.10.
