

IN MEMORIAM



NICK GAREDAKIS: 1932-76

SOMEBODY VERY familiar and special is not with us here today.

He would have been. You can bet on it. But God willed otherwise. Yet, if I know Nick, he's looking down, stopwatch in hand, a smile and a very critical look crossing his face. That would be Nick Garedakis, the very successful former Castlemont High of Oakland track coach who died this January of a heart attack.

It's with honor and pleasure that the CIF dedicates the 1976 State Track and Field Championship Meet to our friend Nick.

He was everyone's friend. Once you made contact with Nick, you were hooked for good. That was one of the ingredients that made him such a success.

He didn't have a background of a great active track career, or majored in college with intention of being a track coach. The track bug simply bit him one day while watching some Castlemont athletes going through their paces.

Prior to that his primary interest leaned towards wrestling. He was an outstanding wrestler at Fremont High of Oakland, where he graduated in the late '40's. He also was student body president. Nick went on to San Francisco State College where he continued as a hot shot wrestler. While student teaching at Oakland High he also served as the assistant wrestling coach.

But once he arrived at Castlemont, the track bug bit hard.

NOT EXACTLY a wizard at the sport, Nick started to read about track from every book he could lay his hands on. He attended every clinic possible, most of the time from his own pockets. He bugged the top college coaches. He learned—fast.

When he became head track coach at Castlemont High in 1958 the Warriors weren't among the elite of Oakland Athletic League track and field.

Once Nick put his bit of magic to work, Castlemont suddenly blossomed into a Northern California power.

His magic was simple: Nick possessed a deep-rooted motivation to help youth. He became so engrossed with track that he wanted to become the best coach around. Nick didn't believe in short cuts. He was a believer in hard, dedicated work. With the rapport he developed with his athletes, he was able to convince his athletes that was the secret to success. Nick's athletes believed in him because of his honesty, dedication, enthusiasm and his concern for their welfare. Perhaps most important he was able to communicate with his athletes. Nick also was liberal with his praise. When an athlete turned in an outstanding performance or whether he simply finished, but still gave 100 per cent, Nick was right there to congratulate or encourage.

By the time he decided to climax his coaching career at Castlemont in 1968 after 10 years, his record was a masterpiece of architecture: 97 dual meet wins out of 99 for a winning percentage of .980. His Warriors were OAL champions in 1959-60-62-63-64-65-66-67-68.

SOME OF THE finest OAL track stars were developed during the Garedakis era. Among the best were Ray Saddler, who in 1960 set the still-existing OAL 440 record of 47.7; an 880 relay team that set the OAL record of 1:26.8 that included Charlie Smith, the former Oakland Raider halfback; Ken Brown, a 6-81/2 high jumper in 1965; and Fred Jackson, who topped that with 6-101/2 in 1966.

Nick's teams also won numerous other titles, such as the El Cerrito and Martinez Relays, and some exciting, wild dual meet wins over his favorite rivals, Berkeley and McClymonds Highs.

But after 10 years of coaching Nick looked for new challenges.

His fame had spread internationally, despite being a high school coach. He was contacted by the government of the Dominican Republic to coach its national track team. The relationship was so amicable that Nick stayed on to direct the Dominicans' national teams to the 1968 (Mexico City) and 1972 (Munich) Olympics.

At the time of his death Nick was the foreign students admissions officer at Laney College in Oakland. As his wife Marie explained, "Nick was just dedicated to helping youth. He was happiest when he was helping someone get ahead."

IRONICALLY, the one goal that Nick sought more than anything while at Castlemont High managed to elude him: a State Meet championship. Despite his great teams, the Warriors couldn't seem to muster the needed points, a testimony to the stiff competition. By John Rodrigues

STERLING MacFARLANE Livermore School District

Though presently a district administrator, Sterling MacFarlane is no stranger to track and field. Thirty-five years of his life has been dedicated to high school athletics. He coached track for 11 years at Idaho Falls High, followed by a long tenure at Pittsburg High where he served both as a coach And principal. One of his star track pupils was Jimmy Briggs, the 1952 State Meet 880 champion. A veteran member and officer of the North Coast Section Board of Managers, "Mac" also served several terms on the CIF Ecological consult and is a recipilant Federated Council and is a recipient of the CIF Honorary Award. Today, MacFarlane is Director of Personnel for the Livermore Valley Unified School District.

WOMENS

IRENE OBERA Berkeley High

The women's section of this year's State Meet is in excellent directional hands with Ms. Obera. She's been girl's track coach and P.E. teacher in the Berkeley schools for 10 years, 1957 to 1967, and today is in adminis-tration. A graduate of Chico State, Irene has been a competitor and administrator for women's track since her undergraduate days. She com-peted for the Laurel Track Club of San Francisco, and in 1968 barely missed making the U.S. Olympic team in the 100 meters. She made it all the way to the finals in the Tryouts. She was a chaperon for two international touring AAU teams, 1967 to the World Games in Tokyo, and 1973 on a European tour.

HONORARY REFEREE

PHIL HEMPLER

Now retired, Hempler devoted 44 years of his life to high school athletics. He served for 20 years at Richmond High as track coach and later athletic director (1929 to 1949). That was followed by various administrative positions, including North Coast Section Commissioner (1949 to 1973), commissioner of the Alameda County Athletic League (1951 to 1973), and chairman of the North Coast Section Track Committee (1952 to 1962), During one eight-year stretch while coaching at Richmond his teams lost only one dual meet. He won four ACAL championships. His powerful 1948 team still holds the ACAL record for the most points scored with 119.

SOUTHLAND SENDS SIZZLING HORDE

The South shall rise again.

Just as it did in 1970 when the California State track and field championships were last held here at Edwards Stadium and athletes representing the Los Angeles City, Southern and San Diego sections picked up eight championships.

This year's group of Southern California performers looks just as potent in both the boys and girls competition.

The Southland contingent includes eight defending champions — four in the boys ranks and four more in the girls division.

The boys winners in 1975 back for another try are San Fernando's Kevin Williams in the 100, Hamilton's Billy Mullins in the 220, La-guna Beach's Eric Hulst in the two mile and Fontana's Paul Wilson in the long jump.


With San Diego's Thom Hunt failing to qualify in the two-mile, Hulst and Mullins look like the best bets to repeat their victories.

Hulst, who set a State record of 8:44.9 last year in San Diego, demonstrated his superiority in the State qualifying meet when he clocked 8:44.6 to establish a Southern Section mark.

It was an especially impressive performance as Hulst ran the entire distance by himself in a bid to break Steve Prefontaine's national mark of 8:41.5.

MULLINS UNCHALLENGED

Mullins has been virtually unchallenged in the 220 this season with a best of 21.2 and a runaway 21.3 victory in the City championships.

Mullins, who had run a State best 47.2 in the quarter earlier in the year but dropped the event to concentrate on the shorter races, was timed in 45.9 on the anchor leg of Hamilton's mile relay win in the City meet.

Fontana's Wilson, who qualified with a jump of 24-111/4, is also an outstanding basketball player.

San Fernando's Kevin Williams, who clocked 9.4 last year, was the L.A. City tri-Player of the Year in football as he helped the Tigers win the City championship. And, two of his football teammates will

also be on hand.

Charles White, the wishbone fullback and another of the tri-Players of the Year (the other was Kenny Moore, the brother of former 49er Manfred Moore), is the favorite in the 330 low hurdles following his performance in the City championships.

White clocked 36.0 to establish a national record, topping the 36.2 set by Dedy Cooper of Harry Ells last year.

In addition, he gualified in the high hurdles and runs on both relay teams. His 46.7 anchor leg in the mile relay brought San Fernando from far back to third place and a spot in the State meet.

Another top football performer is El Cajon's Mark Malone, who rates as the discus favorite off his 192-6 best.

In addition to these performers the athletes to watch are Hunt in the mile, where he has run 4:06.6; Carson's Henry Williams and Gahr's Don Thompson in the quarter; Gahr's Jim Arriola, last year's runnerup, in the mile; Locke's Ron Glenn in the high hurdles; Aviation's Tom Hintnaus, (16-41/2) in the pole vault; Hart's John McKenzie (67-9) in the shot put, and Manual Arts' Larry Doubley (25-4) in the long jump.

GIRLS FIELD

As for the girls events, the defending

champions are Jodi Anderson of Washington in both the 440 and long jump; Los Angeles' Kim Maddox in the high jump, and Bell's Pam Waters in the 220.

Waters, who finished second in the 100 last year, again should face the pressure from Westchester's Kim Robinson, who placed behind her in both the 100 and 220 in the City meet and was second in the State 220 in '75.

Anderson (19–3) again appears the lass in the long jump where she is the two-time defending champion but the 440 could be another story.

Jodi, who also qualified in the 80 low hurdles where she was third last year, finished only fourth in the City championships and will have to go some to overcome perform-

ers such as Kathy Jones of Edison (56.8) and Robbie Mitchell of Fremont (56.9). If Maddox is going to repeat in the high jump, she will probably have to defeat two other Southland performers, Chris Remmling of San Dieguito, and Sue Long of Gahr, the -3 finishers last year at San Diego.

Remmling qualified in 5-81/4 and Long at 5-7, while Maddox needed only a 5-2 mark to win the City championship.

TALENTED SOPHS

Three sophomores making their first appearance in this meet are worth mentioning and will make their presence known.

Lynne Maltinski of Mira Costa, who has run only six competitive miles in her life, set a Southern Section record of 4:56.4 in the mile and is a polished runner with unlimited potential.

Suzie Meek of Palos Verdes is the Southern Section record holder in the 880 at 2:14.8, while Lynne Honeywell of Kennedy of Granada Hills won the 880 (2:17.0) and mile (5:12.4) in the City meet, both in record time.

Willis, Lewis Give S.F. Track a Boost

From the 1972 State Meet in Oroville to the 1974 meet in Bakersfield, Wilson High of San Francisco, under the coaching of Adam Banks, brought to the S.F. Section recognition and respect from the entire California Interscholastic Federation.

After last year's meet in San Diego which saw all the S.F. athletes failing to qualify into the Saturday finals—Wilson's 440 relay team was disqualified from their silver medals for a lane violation—it was thought that it would be a long time before San Francisco schools would again make a strong State showing.

showing. The Spring Sports program was plagued by a City strike in March that curtailed transportation, preventing students from attending classes and athletic teams from traveling to scheduled events.

But that still didn't stop one of the more talented track stars from keeping in condition. Tuquail Willis of Mission vowed to make it to the 1976 State Meet to bring recognition back to San Francisco.

With the strike canceling dual meets and intersectionals, the 6–5, 200-pound Tuquail

was dying for those Saturday invitationals that would prepare him for the stiff State Meet opposition.

First stop was the third annual San Jose Relays with the face-to-face confrontation with local favorites Glenn Cannon of Mt. Pleasant and Keith Taylor of Piedmont Hills, along with the co-holder of the world 100yard dash record, Houston McTear of Florida's Baker High.

The 100 was run in meters to accommodate McTear, gearing himself for the Olympics. Little did track experts know that despite McTear's victory of 10.3, setting a national prep record, Willis' third-place, halfstep finish behind Cannon (both in 10.5) was a stepping stone for the powerful Bear.

The competition was starting to intensify.

At the Sacramento Invitational Willis was nosed out by Santa Rosa Piner High's James Burrell in 9.7. From there it was on to the renowned El Cerrito Relays where Willis' potential began to blossom. He "bombed" a talented field in 9.6, well

He "bombed" a talented field in 9.6, well ahead of Cannon and Burrell, both at 9.8. It was sweet revenge. Next came a biggie Fresno's famous West Coast Relays. Again Willis showed his heels, winning in 9.7, ranking him among the State's premier prep

sprinters.

Now all he had to do to earn a State Meet berth was to win in the San Francisco CIF Sectional Championships. The City strike had been settled and a few meets were sandwiched in.

In the championship meet, Willis faced a good field, including fleet Ernest Lewis of Wilson High who boasted a best time of 9.4, though somewhat suspect because it came in one of the informal City All-Comer's meets during the strike. That time placed him alongside Barstow's Dupree Branch as the fastest preps in California this year.

But Willis made them all take notice with a 9.3 in the trials, though wind-aided. In the finals he led all the way to beat Lewis by two yards in 9.6 to successfully defend his title and claim a spot in the 58th State Meet.

Lewis, though, won't be watching from the Edwards Stadium stands. He looked strong and impressive in overhauling Willis in the final 60 yards of the 220 to win in 21.8, a personal best. Willis' runnerup time was 21.9, though he has a best of 21.2.

So today Willis and Lewis have an opportunity to restore San Francisco's prep track reputation, somewhat tarnished the past couple of years.

Remember Forrest Beaty?

Sure you do. In the early 1960's Forrest Beaty of Hoover High of Glendale was the fastest high school human in America. He had the credentials to prove it: 9.4 and 20.2 sprint times. The 220 time still stands as the national prep record for straightaway.

He won two State Meet 100 titles in 9.6, 1961 and 1962. He won the 220 in 1961 as a junior in 21.4. In 1962 he was 10 yards ahead of the 220 pack when a muscle pull forced him to the sidelines.

Track and Field Magazine named Beaty high school track and field athlete of the year in 1962 for his 9.4 and 20.4 times, plus a 47.3 quarter. When healthy, Forrest Beaty was nearinvincible.

Where is Beaty today?

Why, in Oakland, that's where. He's now Lieutenant Commander Forrest Beaty, U.S. Navy, in charge of the Navy's adolescent medical clinic at the Oakland Naval Hospital.

For the 58th State Meet, he is one of the meet physicians.

How did he decide on medicine? "I always wanted to be a doctor," he explained. So, following his graduation from U.C. Berkeley in 1967 he attended U.C. Medical School in San Francisco. He served his residency in pediatrics at the Oakland Naval Hospital, later earning a fellowship with the Navy in a new field, adolescent medicine, which is the care of youngsters of Navy personnel.

Lt. Beaty will always cherish his track experience and feels that all youngsters should use athletics as a stepping stone to achieve, whether it's a college education, a career, or simply getting something out of life.

"Track taught me a lot," said Lt. Beaty. "It provided me many opportunities I might not have gained. I'd like to see more kids take advantage of that. Too many kids get into athletics but don't take advantage of the opportunities afforded them."

Today, Lt. Beaty lives in Orinda with his wife Peggy and their five children. At 190 pounds he's only seven pounds heavier than when he whizzed around for Hoover High.

He still runs 15 to 20 miles per week, plays a mean game of flag football, and is ever grateful that track paved the way for his career.



SANFORD (SANDY) BERMAN "The Voice"

Coming to you loud and articulate is "The Voice" of today's State Meet, Sanford (Sandy) Berman. Officially, Sandy is chairman of the math department at El Cerrito High School. But to everyone in the area, he's "Mr. Ubiquitous." Seemingly, he is ev-erywhere, conducting classes, tutoring students at his home, attending meetings, and in the midst of every athletic coordinating conclave. "He's the biggest booster of ath-letics in the area," insists John Nules, ath-letic director at El Cerrito High and the Director for this State Meet. Sandy has taught for 18 years in the Richmond School District. He started at Harry Ells, where he founded the school's forensics team. In 1967 he transferred to El Cerrito High. During his high school days at Lowell in San Francisco, Sandy was a ranking tennis player. He later attended San Francisco State. He presently is Commissioner of the Alameda County Athletic League (ACAL), and next term will be commissioner of the new athetic alignment to be called the Richmond-Berkeley Athletic League (RBAL).

Oakland 880 Star Left For Dead

Oakland High School half-miler Bruce Sterling never will forget the night of April 23, 1975.

High in the Oakland hills, two kidnappers left Sterling and Ricky Villanueva for dead that night after an execution-style shooting.

The crime got national publicity because Villanueva, who died from his wounds, was the nephew of U.S. Rep. Ron Dellums, D-Oakland. Incredibly, not only did Sterling survive point-blank shots in the back of the head but he will run in today's 58th annual State Meet. His 1:54.2 makes him one of the favorites.

On that April 23 night, Sterling, Villanueva and Carmen Laris were about to close up and leave work at a fried-chicken drive-in when two young men walked in. One was Edward Lee Word; the other a former All-City high school fullback, Fritz Paige.

The two tried to crack the safe. Frustrated in that and fearing they had been recognized, they forced the three employees into their car and drove to the Merritt College campus.

"I wasn't sure what was going on," Sterling recalled. "I wasn't frightened, because I didn't have any idea they intended to use violence." In an isolated parking lot, Word ordered Sterling and Villanueva to lie face down on the asphalt, leaned over and shot each victim twice with a .22-caliber revolver.


"He hit me twice in the back of the head," said Sterling. "One bullet went in and ricocheted out. The other is still lodged in mv head. The shots didn't bother me at all. I felt absolutely no pain. The doctors decided not to take the other bullet out because it's too close to the spinal cord."

Feigning death, Sterling waited until Word and Paige fled with Miss Laris, then ran about 500 yards and flagged down a motorist. Police caught Word and Paige an hour after the shooting. Word has since been convicted of first degree murder.

"I never went through shock," said Sterling, who was hospitalized only six days and was back on the track running within two weeks.

"At first I suffered some headaches and got a little dizzy, but they're gone now." Sterling said he hasn't been really pressed in racing this year. "At the end I'm rarely tired, because I haven't used my kick."

His coach, Earl Love, says the 5-foot-8, 130-pound senior is "a natural middle-distance runner who could be one of the nation's best in a few years. He is fluid, has excellent breathing and carries a slight frame on long legs.





Annually, each high school section selects a man for honors, who has contributed notably to the sport of track and field.



PETE ZAMPERINI, Banning High, Los Angeles City Section. "The Silver Eagle" has never coached a losing season in 23 years of track at Banning. He started at Banning in 1952 and retired from active coaching in 1974. His teams have won 8 varsity, 14 JV and 16 10th grade titles. In approximately 140 cross country meets his teams have lost only 15. He coached at Torrance High from 1938 to 1947. Pete's brother, Lou, was the all-time USC dis-

tance star. Lou broke the State mile record when he won in 1934 in 4:27.8 running for Torrance. His best of 4:21.1 that year set a national record. Pete also competed for Torrance and USC with best times of 1:53.5 and 4:18 as a Trojan.



CARSON ENGLISH, Balboa High, San Francisco Section. It didn't take Coach English long to estab-lish his mark on the San Francisco prep track scene. In just three years his Bucs have swept to the City title, compiling a 42-1 dual meet record. He presently is riding a 34-meet dual meet winning streak. A graduate of Cal State-Hayward, English has been teaching in the San Francisco system for eight years. He holds degrees in Art and physical edu-

cation. Competing for the Pioneers he was Far Western Conference high jump (6-7) and broad jump (24-4) champion.



HARRY TAYLOR, Chula Vista High, San Diego Section. The head man since 1961, Coach Taylor's teams have been consistent winners through his guidance and inspirational leadership. Perhaps the best product developed by Taylor was Tim Danielson, two-time State mile champion in 1965 and 1966. Tim in 1966 became the second prep runner to dip under four minutes with a 3:59.4. Danielson broke the State mile record in 1966 with his 4:07

until Mark Schilling broke it in 1972 with 4:05.4. Prior to his arrival at Chula Vista, Taylor coached at Arroyo and Leuziner Highs in Los Angeles.



AL HOOKER, La Sierra High, Sac-Joaquin Section. Now in his 12th year of coaching track, Coach Hooker has produced four league championships and four runners-up. Among the State Meet athletes he has developed were two seven-foot high jumpers, two 15-foot pole vaulters, plus several outstanding hurdlers and distance runners. In addition to his coaching duties, he has served as meet director of the Golden West Invitational for two

years, and two Sac-Joaquin Section meets. He also assisted in staging the 1973 State Meet in Woodland. Coach Hooker has served as a member of the Sac-Joaquin track committee for eight years and as Central Valley Conference track chairman for six vears.

ROBERT STUART, North Coast Section. Now retired, Stuart was the key influential figure in the development of track and field at Ells High, Richmond. From 1955 to 1972, Ells was always considered a prime contender in Bay Area prep track circles. Among the outstanding athletes developed by Stuart included Travis Williams, a consistent 9.6 sprinter, who later set a national J.C. 100 record of 9.3, and went on to gain fame as a professional football player with Green Bay and Los Angeles; Tom Cousey, who won the exhibition triple jump at the 1960 State Meet; two 50-foot-plus shot putters Bob Hudson and John Sutro; Ricky Rogers, a 14.3 hurdler; Robert Redditt, 23-11 broad jumper who com-peted in the 1964 State Meet, and the 1967 mile relay team that won the State Meet when it was still an exhibition event.



And get this: at Summerville High she is athletic director for BOTH boys and girls!



DIXIE GRIFFIN, John F. Kennedy High, Los Angeles Section. A graduate of the L.A. City schools system, Dixie went on to earn a degree from the University of Hawaii and is presently working on a masters degree. In addition to participating herself, Coach Griffin has done much in Los Angeles to further girls track. She authored the rules and regulations for girls' interscholastic track program for the L.A. City schools in 1974, and has served since 1974 as the girls' interscholastic track sports coordinator for L.A. City schools. She has been girls track coach at Kennedy since 1965. As a competitor for 10 years, Dixie was a National AAU shot put champion, and also threw the discus and javelin. She was ranked one of the top 10 women athletes in the United States in 1956-57.

LINDA SAWYER, Las Lomas High, North Coast Section. Six years ago Linda inherited a girl's team of four. Today, Las Lomas fields a full contingent and is consistently a league contender. Las Lomas has been runnerup in the Foothills Athletic League for the last three years. She has acted as meet director of the annual George DeKlotz Relays, and the girls' qualifying for the State Meet. Two of Linda's girls qualified for last year's State Meet.







FAYE MENDENHALL, Coalinga High, Central Section. In five years at Coalinga Coach Men-denhall's teams have won two league titles and placed second once. She had one State Meet qualifier in 1974 and four last year, including Alice Trumbly who placed second in the 880 in 2:12.1. She also has coached volleyball for three years, winning two league championships. For the past four years she has served as league rep for girl's sports, and served on the Central Section Girl's Track Committee since 1973. A graduate of Humboldt State, she helps coach AAU age group track.

SANDRA WILLIAMS, Royal High, Southern Section. During her nine-year tenure as girl's track coach her teams, up to midway this season, have compiled a dual meet record of 45–14–1. Royal has won the Marmonte League championship four of the last six years, and second twice. Thanks to Coach Williams' leadership girls cross country will become official in the Southern Section next season. She also has had varied experience in AAU coaching and officiating, acting as meet director of National AAU championships in both cross country and track and field, touring with several international teams.

FRAN DAVENPORT, Poway High, San Diego Section. Coach Davenport got hooked on track at Vista High, where she graduated in 1961. It began with Olympic development meets from which she graduated to become the girls' and women's national javelin champion in 1961 and 1963, set an American javelin record while competing in Germany in 1963, a Silver medalist in the 1963 Pan-Am Games in Sao Paulo, Brazil. She settled down to coaching in 1973 at Poway High. Fran was the women's coach for the San Diego youth track team that traveled to Hawaii and Japan for international meets in 1975.

MEET ARCHITECTS

Three men are the prime architects of the 1976 State Meet, John Nules, director; Bob Anderson, assistant director, both from El Cerrito High School, and a mighty familiar name, Hale Roach.

If the latter name sounds familiar, it should. Hale is the former track coach at El Cerrito High who retired two years ago. He is acting as advisor to Nules and Anderson.

Roach wouldn't miss this meet if his life depended on it. He was the first coach ever hired when El Cerrito opened its campus in 1941. Since then Hale has served in every coaching capacity.

But track and field was his first love.

He built the Gauchos into perennial powers. He founded the El Cerrito Relays, which today—since renamed the Hale Roach Relays, for obvious reasons—is one of the most prestigeous in Northern California.

When it comes to planning, organizing and managing a track meet, Roach is unequaled. He is a model of efficiency. His meets always ran like clock-work.

The outstanding athletes produced by Roach are numerous. But one of the best was halfmiler Dale Scott who ran the second-fastest 880 in State Meet history to win in 1972 at Oroville in 1:49.7. Scott today is running for Washington State.

Two relay teams brought home State Meet blue ribbons under Roach. In 1971 the 440 relay team won in 41.1, a record until Wilson High of San Francisco shaved a tenth-second off in 1973. The mile relay team was No. 1 in the State in 1972 with a 3:17.6 time.

Roach served as State Meet director twice, 1966 and 1968, and both times Nules was his assistant, along with Anderson. Thus Nules and Anderson both were primed when they were assigned the task of directing this meet.

In fact, the two started planning for this date at last year's State Meet in San Diego. Both observed the organization and management, coordinated their findings and came up with a formula for the 1976 State Meet.

Hope you enjoy it.

RAIDER TRAINER ON JOB



The care and physical pampering of the athletes in the 58th State Meet will be in good hands.

George Anderson, official trainer for the 1976 State Meet, is the trainer for the Oakland Raiders, those perennial pro football champions. George is one of the few remaining original Oakland Raiders, starting with the organization in 1960.

George's interest in prep sports stems from his boy, Brad, a junior at Pinole Valley High. Brad is a 14.9 hurdler and the starting wide receiver on the Spartan football team. "I played sports in high school (Vallejo High) and I really enjoy high school athletics," said George. "That's where you really have fun."

Anderson left Vallejo High in 1946 to join the Army. Following his discharge in 1948 he enrolled at San Jose State and went out for football. But a knee injury ended that dream and that's when George, devoted to sports, decided to become a trainer.

After 10 years as a trainer at Odessa (Texas) High, Southern California, and the University of California at Berkeley, Anderson joined the new pro football franchise in Oakland when the American Football League was founded.

Today, George lives in Pinole with his wife Marcy and their three children.

STATE MEET CONFIDENTIAL

Hold on to your wooden plank because there are going to be some sizzling events going on at Edwards Stadium, Berkeley, for two days.

With the exception of Eric Hulst, there doesn't appear to be many clear-cut winners. Don't be surprised if a defending champion or two fails to repeat. There are four: Billy Mullins of LA Hamilton in the 100; Kevin Williams of San Fernando in the 220, Paul Wilson of Fontana in the long jump, and Hulst. Jim Arriola of Gahr was second in the mile last year in 4:10.1, but his best this year is only 4:10.9.

How about the crushing disappointment by Corning's Jeff Stover who tossed the shot put 65–9 but didn't make the State Meet! He was beaten by Lassen's Steve Montgomery who had to throw $66-10^{3}/_{4}$. Only one competitor from each event qualifies from the Northern Section.

One of the best buys is a pocket-book size tome that highlights every State Meet, 1915 to 1975. It's fascinating reading, and Donn Kirk, David Cooper and Keith Conning deserve plaudits, and the \$2.00 price, for their exhausting research efforts. It's on sale under the stands.





Berkeley Soph Freida on Tear

The North Coast Section will be seeking its third State Meet team championship in as many years this weekend.

Berkeley won the first girls' competition at Bakersfield in 1974, and the boys of Richmond's Harry Ells captured the crown a year ago in San Diego.


Berkeley High's girls, led by pig-tailed sophomore speedster Freida Cobbs, are once again the favorites. Freida won both sprints at last week's North Coast Section Meet of Champions in Berkeley, was lead-off in the 440 relay and anchored the mile relay, both winners. That's four blue ribbons for little Freida.

Her times of 10.7 and 24.2w, superb in their own rights, were more credible since they were run here on the slow Edwards Stadium track. The Yellowjackets' relay times in the finals were 48-flat and 3:59.9.

Cobbs, who had a legal 24.2 in February and a 23.7 last year, ran 10.9 her first meet out this season. She has been plagued with injuries to her quadraceps, hamstring and hip, forcing her to miss a month of valuable competition with the hip ailment.

In fact, her hip still has not fully recovered. It shows during the start of her races when she stands up from the blocks instead of a low get-away. But the injuries have not hampered her effectiveness: she remains undefeated in high school competition this year.

"She has a desire to be good," says coach Willie White, the man who won the

1956 State Meet low hurdles in 18.9 and the 100 in 9.5 while running for Los Angeles' Jefferson High. Both times set State records at the time.

"She believes in herself and what she can do," adds White. "Were it not for her hip, she would be down around 23.3 for the 220."

Cobbs herself thinks she can get down to 22.9. She would like to step up to the 440 soon, which would push her out of the 100. Freida had an unofficial 56.8 split on Berkeley's mile relay last week.

"Our mile relay can get down to 3:55 or 3:54 if people run like they are supposed to," comments White. "Our 440 relay team has the potential to hit 47.5." That would tie the State record.

There will be plenty of pressure on Berkeley High competing at home, but the girls have obliterated all-comers this season. "I think they can handle it any way it comes because they believe they're pretty good," White explains.

Overlooked by most everyone is Annette Robinson. In 1974-75 she ran in the shadow of Marie Nickson, third and fourth in the State 220 and 100 respectively last year. This season, when the limelight might have been hers, Cobbs emerged.

Robinson ran second to Cobbs in both sprints in the NCS championships last week in 11.0 and 25.0w. The winning sprint times in the Los Angeles City finals were 10.9 and 24.4, while the Southern CIF finals were 10.9 and 25.2.

Annette also is part of the relay team, joined by junior Candy Ross and Kim Burgess. Their best relay times are 47.9 and 3:59.9. The winning times in the L.A. City were 48.2 and 3:58.4, both by Fremont, while in the Southern CIF Centennial won the 440 relay in 47.9 and Arcadia the mile relay in 3:58.0. It looks like a royal battle here.

In addition to her sprinting, Candy also is a capable high jumper, good enough to win last week at 5–8 without a miss. She'll be after the State record of 5–8.

Burgess could add points in the hurdles and Vanessa Brooks may score in the shot put.

This doesn't appear to be the year the North Coast Section boys will make any significant dents against the Southland horde, but a few athletes bear watching and should distinguish themselves.

Heading the list is American High of Fremont's John Lane, over seven feet in the high jump (6-10 last week). He may be ready for another seven-foot leap today, since this will be his home pit for the next four years. He has signed a letter of intent to attend UC Berkeley.

Another South Alameda County standout is shot putter Conrad Jepsen of Fremont's Washington High with a best of 63 feet. He'll tangle with Hart's John McKenzie (67–9) and Lassen's Steve Montgomery (66–10³/₄).

Pittsburg's Derald Harris, with a best of 47.8 in the 440, hasn't been pushed this year.

But he will be contested here against the likes of Gahr's Donn Thompson (47.0), Carson's Henry Williams (47.7) and Piedmont Hills' (San Jose) Keith Taylor (47.8). Taylor could be the sleeper here.

Chris Koko of Hayward's Sunset High has been improving in the hurdles and may be ready for a big effort. He won the North Coast 330 hurdles in 37.6, equaling his best. But tops here is the new National recordholder, Charles White of San Fernando, who stopped the watches at 36-flat in Los Angeles last Saturday. He could go lower with the likes of Koko, Silver Creek's Andrew Phillips (36.4) and Serramonte's Tommy Bobertz (37.5) pushing.

The century should live up to its name as the Classic Race with San Francisco entry Tuquail Willis of Mission with his windy 9.3 and legit 9.6, and Mt. Pleasant's Glenn Cannon (9.6) against the Southland greyhounds: Defending champion Kevin Williams of San Fernando (9.6), David Russell of San Diego's Patrick Henry (9.5) and Norris Jones of Kennedy-Barstow (9.5).

Oakland's Kurt Durham has a 24–2 long jump, but even equaling that may not be enough for the blue ribbon, what with two Southern Cal kangaroos, Larry Doubley of Manual Arts at 25-4 and Paul Wilson of Fontana at $24-11\frac{1}{4}$.

But Darrell Mellion of St. Mary's (48-71/2) and Cephus Johnson of Hayward's Mt. Eden (49-0) have an outside chance in the triple jump, though Pete Moreno of James Lick has a 50-footer, and three Southlanders are over 49 feet. Berkeley High's Anthony Hill (176-4) will really have to unwind his alltime best to even place in the discus.







CIF AND OLYMPIC GOLD-WHO WILL BE NEXT?

There are many reasons why sports scribes refer to the California Interscholastic Federation Track & Field Championships as the "Olympic Games of Prepdom."

Much of the reasoning is the excellence and depth of performance which annually makes the CIF meet one of the finest in the country on the high school or any other level.

There are other reasons: Lee Barnes, Frank Wykoff and Bob Mathias to name three.

They won CIF titles in 1924 (Barnes), 1928 (Wykoff) and 1948 (Mathias), respectively. And, also in those same years, the trio won gold medals in the Olympic Games, Barnes in Paris, Wykoff in Amsterdam, and Mathias in the first post-World War II Olympiad in London.

Barnes, competing for Hollywood High, shared the CIF pole vault crown with Harry Smith (San Diego) in 1923 at $12-35_{/8}$ and won it outright with a meet mark of $12-11\frac{1}{2}$ in 1924. Barnes won Olympic gold with that same height in Paris just a short time after he was graduated from Hollywood High.

Wykoff, from Glendale High, rates as one of California's all-time schoolboy greats. As a junior in 1927, he won three events in the CIF meet at Modesto and anchored the winning 880 relay team to victory. He won the 100 in 9.8, the 220 in 21.0, and the long jump at 22–2. He's one of the few to record such a feat in the 57 CIF meets that have been contested.

Wykoff won only one event in 1928, the 220 in 21.4, but soon after he graduated from Glendale High, he qualified for the United States Olympic team and was a member of the winning 400 meter relay team in Amsterdam in 41.0. He also ran on winning USA Olympic relay teams in the 1932 Games in Los Angeles in 40.0, and in the '36 Games in Berlin in 39.8. Also running with Wykoff in 1936 was Californian Foy Draper (Huntington Park), plus the legendary Jesse Owens and Ralph Metcalfe.

Mathias' feats are among the most dramatic in Olympic history, and certainly, his triumph in the 1948 decathlon in virtual darkness ranks as one of the most memorable in all athletic annals.

The 1948 State Champion in the 120 yard high hurdles and 180 yard low hurdles in 14.3 and 19.6, Mathias totaled 7,139 points to win the decathlon in London shortly after graduating from Tulare High School. He repeated his Gold Medal performance with a total of 7,887 points in the 1952 Games in Helsinki.

The list of remaining athletes who claimed CIF titles and Olympic Gold is most impressive.

Start with Charley Paddock (Pasadena), and few sprinters in history had a better start or finish. Then comes Clarence (Bud) Houser (Oxnard), Bill Miller (San Diego), Draper (Huntington Park), Cornelius (Corny) Johnson (Los Angeles), Wilbur (Moose) Thompson (Modesto), Leamon King (Delano), Rafer Johnson (Kingsburg), Charley Dumas (Centennial of Compton), Ulis Williams (Compton), Richard Stebbins (Fremont of Los Angeles), Tommie Smith (Lemoore), James Hines (McClymonds of Oakland) and Randy Williams (Edison of Fresno.)

Had CIF meets been contested during the World War II years, Mel Patton (University High of Los Angeles) and Mal Whitfield (Jefferson of Los Angeles) most certainly would have been part of the list of athletes claiming CIF and Olympic Gold.

Patton won the 200 meters in the '48 Olympics in 21.1, and also ran on the winning 400 meter relay team in 40.6. Whitfield won Olympic 800 meter crowns in '48 and '52 in the identical times of 1:49.2 and he also ran on the winning 1600 meter relay team in '48.

Sim Iness (Tulare), a high school teammate of Mathias, is another who might have been on that list. He won the Olympic discus crown with a toss of 180–6 in 1952. The discus didn't become an official State Meet event until 1959.

The parade of Olympic Gold Medalists who did not win CIF titles includes current world record holder for 400 meters, Lee Evans (Overfelt of San Jose), who set that mark with his blazing 43.8 in the 1968 Mexico City Olympics.

In the same category are sprinters Ronnie Ray Smith (Manual Arts of Los Angeles) and Eddie Hart (Pittsburg) along with 400 meter dashmen Michael Larrabee (Ventura, Otis Davis (Manual Arts of Los Angeles), Earl Young (San Fernando) and Jack Yerman (Woodland).

There are at least three others—long jumper Willie Steele (San Diego Hoover) who won Olympic Gold (25–8) in 1948, Bob Seagren (Pomona) who won the pole vault $(17-8\frac{1}{2})$ at Mexico City in 1968, and Parry O'Brien (Santa Monica) who revolutionized the shot put after leaving high school. The first man to surpass 60 feet, O'Brien won the Helsinki 'Games in 1952 (57–1 $\frac{1}{2}$) and repeated in Melbourne in 1956 (60–11).

With track buffs the world over thinking of the upcoming Olympics in Montreal, is it reasonable to expect an athlete competing in the 58th annual CIF meet to win Olympic Gold, or even to qualify for the team.

Chances are not great, even with the quality of athletes competing this year, but there probably were few who gave Barnes, Wykoff and Mathias much chance in '24, '28 and '48.

The last Californian to make the Olympic team as a schoolboy was Reynaldo Brown (Compton). He cleared 7–3 (all time best by a prep) in the Trials to earn the trip to Mexico City in 1968 shortly after completing his junior year at Compton. He claimed three straight CIF crowns -6-93% in '67, 7–0 in '68 and 7–0 in '69.






